## What other approaches are used to find research?

HANDSEARCHING key journals	<ul> <li>Journal websites</li> <li>Ulrich's serials directory (Abstracting &amp; Indexing)</li> <li>Journal Citation Reports</li> </ul>
KEY RESEARCHERS in the field	<ul> <li>Author searching in databases</li> <li>Contact by email</li> <li>Cochrane Collaboration website for reviews that are in progress (P) or intended (T)</li> <li>Prospero is a new registry of systematic review protocols by the Centre for Reviews and Dissemination http://www.crd.york.ac.uk/prospero/</li> </ul>
CITATION PEARL GROWING*	<ul> <li>When you have a relevant citation, examine the terms used to index the article and incorporate these into your search strategy.</li> <li>The Related Articles feature in PubMed is like an automated equivalent of citation pearl growing.</li> </ul>
FOOTNOTE CHASING* (BACKWARD CHAINING)	Track down citations from the bibliography of the article you have in hand.
CITATION SEARCHING* (FORWARD CHAINING)	<ul> <li>Find reference that have cited the article you have in hand.</li> <li>Web of Science</li> <li>Google Scholar</li> </ul>
