INEQUALITY

- Divided city where the extremely wealthy live in close proximity with those in poverty (favelas)
- Low-income pushed out to the city's western and northern peripheries
- Events such as the Olympics and World Cup have increased this inequality between both classes
- Minha Casa Minha Vida




GENTRIFICATION

- One group replacing another due to the financialization of urban land markets
- Pressures created by the rent gap are being enhanced by external factors like state-led infrastructure and security investments resulting from the mega sporting events
- Zoning law alterations have increased land rents



ECONOMIC

- Brazilian government spent about USD \$3 billionmostly on new and refurbished stadiums, 90 percent of it being public money
- Fictitious commodification of land, labour, and money in relation to housing and gentrification
