In the <u>2014 Tutu Lecture "Women in Peace" Mary Robinson</u>, President of Ireland, and the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights spoke to the importance of gender equality of the decision-makers in the room. And the value of amplifying the voice of women leaders brings more to the room and the decisions – Her practical recommendation was simple: "that women in positions of authority walk into a room that is dominated by men should ask "What's wrong with this room?""

Kelsey Merkley started <u>UnCommon Women</u> because she saw a gap between the women in senior operating roles and the men in "Thought Leader" roles. In other words, the women were getting s*** done. Kelsey wanted to celebrate and amplify the many strong brilliant and busy women of the commons.

Join Kelsey Merkley as she interviews and facilitates a conversation with a few of the UnCommon Women (Kory Wilson, Surita Jhangiani, Gwen Bird, and Rosie Redfield) in the lower mainland, BC. This is a kick off event for Open Education week and we hope you join us!

Pixelating DH Mixer - OpenStreetMap Mapping Party

Join us for an introductory session and mapping party where we will contribute to the freely accessible, non-commercial dataset of the world – OpenStreetMap (OSM). Contributions from this mapping party are toward Building Canada 2020 (BC2020i) – a nation-wide initiative to map all of Canada's buildings by 2020. With the aid of aerial imagery, we will map buildings in rural Masset and Trail, British Columbia. Inexperienced mappers are welcome (and encouraged!) to attend. The first 30 minutes of this session will be an info session to give new mappers a firm understanding of OSM principals and get off the ground to start adding buildings with confidence. Attendees can expect to spend about an hour mapping their area of choice. Pizza and light refreshments will be provided. OSM is a mapping collaborative aiming to create an open geographic dataset of the world, collected and imported by volunteers worldwide. OSM data is used by a variety of industries for a wide range of purposes as a replacement for other proprietary sources of geographic data – and map parties and mapathons are particularly notable for their benefit to emergency response efforts after large natural disasters as they can provide swift logistical support for on-site responders.

Kory is Chair of the National Indigenous Education Committee of Colleges and Institutions Canada and a Global Access to Post-Secondary Education Ambassador. Kory has a law degree from UBC. With over 20 years of experience in post-secondary education, community development, and the legal profession, Kory's passion lies "in ensuring success for Aboriginal Learners and other multi-barriered learners". She has a deep commitment to education and has dedicated her working life to ensuring that under-represented learners succeed, both within learning institutions and the larger community. Kory is a member of the We Wai Kai Nation (Quadra Island) and is Musgamagw Tsawataineuk and Laich-Kwil-Tach. Both nations are part of the Kwakwaka'wakw Nation, also known as the Kwak'wala speaking people.

10:50-11:20 am Launching Canada's first Zed Cred programs – Krista Lambert, Open Education Advisor, BCcampus/Instructional Designer, JIBC & Dr. Rajiv Jhangiani, Special Advisor to the Provost on Open Education, KPU

A "Zed Cred" refers to a degree pathway that involves zero textbook costs, based on the adoption of open educational resources (e.g., open textbooks) or use of institutionally subscribed resources (e.g., library databases). In 2017, BCcampus awarded Zed Cred grants to three BC institutions—Kwantlen Polytechnic University (KPU), Thompson Rivers University, Open Learning (TRU-OL), and the Justice Institute of British Columbia (JIBC).

In this session, members of the Zed Cred teams will describe the collaborative approach to co-developing and peer-reviewing resources as well as share strategies used to build institutional capacity (e.g., faculty and staff training), identifying and overcoming challenges (e.g., integrating a Zed Cred notation in course timetables), conducting research (e.g., to evaluate the institutional impact of OER adoption), and developing a strategic framework.

Wikimedia Foundation found that less than 10% of its contributors identify as female. While the reasons for the gender gap are up for debate, the practical effect of the disparity is not: content is skewed by the

lack of female participation. This represents an alarming absence in an important repository of shared knowledge. The <u>Art + Feminism Wikipedia Edit-a-Thon</u> is an event held internationally to raise the profile of female artists in Wikipedia. Participants edit, update, or create entries that directly impacts the Wikipedia knowledge-base.
