
UBC Sexual Misconduct Policy (SC 17)

stresses that the victim was drunk






SPOT THE DIFFERENCES!

 and process support in response to Disclosures of sexual violence

WHAT WOULD YOU SAY?

- You are receiving a disclosure about an incident a few days ago. The survivor says, I knew I shouldn't have gone to [event where incident occurred] alone.
 - Consider: countering victim blaming/self-blaming
- Someone tells you about an incident they witnessed. They are angry and want the university to take action against the person they witnessed perpetrate.
 - Consider: empathy and customizing responses; survivor self-determination
- After hearing about a situation involving gender-based harassment, you suggest connecting with SVPRO. The person being targeted by the harassment says, "yeah, maybe. I mean, it's not that big of a deal I guess."
 - Consider: pervasiveness of violence, restoring sense of safety, survivor self-determination
