





























# The 5 R's of Open Content:

01	Retain	<ul> <li>make, own, and control a copy of the resource</li> <li>e.g. download and keep your own copy</li> </ul>
02	Revise	<ul> <li>edit, adapt, and modify your copy of the resource</li> <li>e.g. translate into another language</li> </ul>
03	Remix	<ul> <li>combine your original or revised version with other existing material to create something new</li> <li>e.g. make a mashup</li> </ul>
04	Reuse	<ul> <li>use your original, revised, or remixed copy of the resource publicly</li> <li>e.g. on a website, in a presentation, in a class</li> </ul>
05	Redistribute	<ul> <li>share copies with others</li> <li>e.g. post a copy online</li> </ul>

Free or minimal fees for users	Ability to view/read/use with no or minimal barriers (bandwidth needed, software, passwords, account creations, memberships, etc)	Open copyright licenses that allow for reuse, modification, commercial use, etc  Formats that allow for editing, copying, etc.	Digital accessibility, Universal Design for Learning	Open participation, community engagement, development of networks, students contributing knowledge, inclusion, etc.

Open Educational Resources (OER) are any teaching and learning resources that are free of cost and access barriers, and which also carry legal permission for open use allows anyone to freely use, adapt and share the resource—anytime, anywhere"

# What is Copyright?

When any person creates an original "work", the law of copyright automatically governs who has the right to produce, copy, perform, publish, adapt, translate or telecommunicate that work.

#### The term "work" means:

 any literary, artistic, dramatic and musical work, a computer program, a translation of a work, a compilation of others' works, a recording of any kind, and, a performance of a work.


Copyright applies once the work is put into a fixed form (e.g. written down on paper, saved on a computer, recorded, videotaped, or painted on canvas).




In Canada, when you take a photo, you automatically own the copyright of the photo you take!

You're the copyright holder of the photo = you are free to do anything to the photo including copying, distributing and modifying the photo you take

- Photo taken by Jenny
- Jenny is the copyright holder.

If you want to use Jenny's photo for her assignment, you will need to **get permission** from Jenny.





# "Certain Conditions"





## **Attribution**

Others can copy, distribute, display, perform and remix your work if they credit your name as requested by you





### **No Derivative Works**

Others can only copy, distribute, display or perform verbatim copies of your work





#### **Share Alike**







Others can distribute your work only under a license identical to the one you have chosen for your work





Others can copy, distribute, display, perform or remix your work but for non-commercial purposes only.











# Creative Commons License is a Way to Give Permission for People to Reuse Your Work



You still own the copyright, but you allow others to reuse the work, provided the cite/attribute you as the "author" of the work

- Photo taken by Jenny
- Jenny is still the copyright holder.
- Jenny decided to license her work as Creative Commons License (CC BY)

As long as you **credit/attribute** Jenny's photo, you have a permission to use Jenny's photo



#### **Requires Permission**




Figure 1: Map of Kakamega Forest.

## **Creative Commons Reflections**

- Have you met the license conditions?
   Have you provided attribution?

- Is the text culturally sensitive?
- Is the content accessible to students with diverse abilities?





